Authors keep us interested in a text by using interesting punctuation and vocabulary to describe characters and settings.	Narrative writing To write engaging narratives for our audience. E.g. Using dialogue, wow words, similes and interesting punctuation to keep our readers interested in our narrative.	The trigraph /our/ as in colour. Eg. colour, flavouring, neighbourhood.
